



#### INTRODUCTION

Quarter 1 Update: January 1 - March 31, 2024

The first quarter of 2024 included several public events, including an RCMP open house to receive input for service priorities, a construction progress celebration for the Cowichan Sportsplex, a grand opening of the washroom building at Kinsmen Beach, a Master Transportation Plan open house, and a discussion with the Chemainus Residents Association on the challenges of climate change.

At the Cowichan Aquatic Centre, there were 4,045 registrations for winter programs in Q1, generating \$179,000 in total revenue. Admission numbers continue to increase, up over 11 per cent from Q1 last year and 15 per cent from last quarter.


Collaboration on projects and services continues with regional government partners, such as the Cowichan Valley Regional District (CVRD) and the City of Duncan. Staff supported the CVRD, the City of Duncan, the Somenos Marsh Wildlife Society, and the Island Corridor Foundation for right-of-way maintenance along the rail corridor. This included cleaning up and removing

vegetation and danger trees along the Friendship Trail between James Street and Beverly Street. Improvements will continue into Q2 with landscaping work. Staff also worked with the CVRD on flood response planning, and a broad range of regional partners to strategize and align water conservation messaging in anticipation of our continued warmer and drier summers.

Several employees received recognition for their public service for reaching milestones of 10+ years with the Municipality, including one staff member who reached 25 years.

During this quarter, North Cowichan recognized Pink Shirt Day (February 28) and International Women's Day (March 8). Staff and the general public were informed about the importance of inclusion and supporting gender equality. Staff and Council showed their support by wearing pink.

An encroachment agreement with Cowichan Tribes for the Samsun Narrows Hydrophone Project at Peters Lane Park was



To continue increasing awareness of waste reduction, 690 students from elementary schools in North Cowichan participated in this year's environmental education program. They were taught about waste streams, food waste, and composting. The 2024 environmental education contest winners were celebrated at the April 3 Council meeting.

the opioid crisis and related street disorder. Staff are working collaboratively with BC Transit on safety at bus shelters, meeting with CVRD staff to discuss options for the warming centre, and initiating patrols of Somenos Marsh to address encampment activity. We continue to advocate for additional substance use services to provincial ministries and Vancouver Island Health Authority to support the provision of detox and recovery function in the Cowichan region.
