



INTRODUCTION

Quarter 1 Update: January 1 - March 31, 2025

During this quarter, North Cowichan advanced a range of projects and initiatives that reflect its ongoing commitment to service delivery, community well-being, environmental stewardship, and relationship-building.

Demonstrating continued commitment to delivering a high level of service in the community, the completion of maintenance and culvert replacement around Chemainus Lake trail has improved accessibility and safety for trail users and increased environmental protection. Additionally, the Canada Avenue Active Transportation Project (Sherman Road – James Street) is at 80% completion in its detailed design phase.

Youth Outreach Services received localized grant funding to expand and upgrade equipment for youth enjoyment, including new scooters and skateboard helmets, enhancing recreational opportunities for youth.

Council entered a new contract with Recycle BC for recycling collection, which ensures the municipality is financially

compensated for collecting recycling from curbside customers.

Recreation staff have engaged MAE Engineering to lead the redesign of the underground water piping at Crofton Outdoor Pool, with construction expected to start in Q3.

A Request for Proposal (RFP) for the co-management framework was issued in partnership with Quw'utsun Nation in February. The RFP closed in March, and a number of submissions were received. The anticipated contract award and commencement of work are expected to occur in Q2 following the completion of joint evaluations of the submissions.

The sale of the RCMP building on Canada Avenue to Cowichan Tribes was completed in Q1. The property sold for \$1.2 million, with funds placed in the Land Sales Reserve for future acquisitions.

North Cowichan remains committed to developing strong relationships with Indigenous Peoples. In January, a ceremony

was held to unveil the First Nation totem and artwork at the new RCMP building, celebrating the relationships between Cowichan Tribes and the detachment.

Management staff attended training in March that focused on First Nations culture and history and the implications of that history on current relations and operations. Further sessions are planned for June and September.

A letter of support was provided to Halalt First Nation as part of the application to the Watershed Security Fund to advance the Indigenous-led Restoration Planning for the Chemainus Watershed.

Staff worked with the Community Land Trust to complete the lease, subdivision, and housing agreement components of the affordable housing project located next to the Curling Club at 3191 Sherman Road.

The Director of Engineering presented the results of detailed infrastructure modelling that has been completed. The report identified that the municipality has approximately 20 years of servicing capacity remaining. The report also noted the infrastructure that is required across the municipality's water and sewer system to service additional development. Staff also brought forward bylaw amendments to limit the municipality's liability, as well as other mitigation steps that staff are currently developing and bringing back to Council soon for further direction.

Natural gas consumption at the Cowichan Aquatic Centre was reduced by 71% compared to the same period in 2024, thanks to the implementation of new digital

control systems and recommissioning the water-towater heat pumps as the primary heating source. This resulted in year-over-year savings of \$27,175.

The new RCMP building's solar array generated 65,863 kWh of electricity in 2024 once it commenced operation in June, equivalent to the annual consumption of 51 single-family houses.

Staff continue to provide resourcing as part of the ongoing opioid epidemic and the resultant public disorder, in particular in the Trans-Canada Highway corridor. A review of community policing was conducted to explore ways that this function can support efforts to address public disorder. Ongoing collaborative meetings continue under the "Safer Community" umbrella with the City of Duncan, the RCMP, and North Cowichan

Bylaw. Discussions were initiated with Together We Can to explore the establishment of a recovery centre.

The public spaces cleaning operations continued into Q1, with two part-time staff members providing daily cleaning measures along the corridor areas of Beverly, York, Lewis, and James Street. Additionally, cleaning is taking place along the Somenos dykes, Cowichan Commons, and University Way areas.

This quarter, staff received communications recognizing Pink Shirt Day on February 26 taking a stand against bullying and a reminder to promote kindness, respect, and inclusion, as well as messages celebrating International Women's Day on March 8.

A new accessible picnic table was also installed, with one planned to be installed at Kin Beach park in Q4. A new dock was installed at Art Mann Park. The 16'x80' aluminum frame dock includes universal water access for kayaks, canoes, and retractable cleats for boats to tie up. The playing surface of the tennis courts at Properties Park has been repaired and upgraded, enhancing the playing conditions. The Cowichan Aquatic Centre annual maintenance shutdown occurred September 14-October 6. Significant mechanical upgrades were performed during this time, including the installation of a new building automation system 	 Chemainus Ball Field 2 received infield upgrades to address drainage and player safety issues. Work was completed in the off season so that the field is ready for community use at the start of the 2025 ball season. Machine trail maintenance was completed on the upper Double D trail located on Mount Tzouhalem. This trail is subject to heavy ridership and use and requires regular maintenance supported by the Cowichan Trail Stewardship Society. Staff replaced the gazebo roof along the Crofton Seawalk as the original structure had shown signs of excessive wear and had exceeded its life expectancy. The new metal roof is a welcomed addition and was completed by carpentry staffing. Brooke Street sewer main replacement. Crofton Fire Hall completion. November 15 was the grand opening of the Field House at the Cowichan Sportsplex.
