



INTRODUCTION

Quarter 2 Update: April 1 - June 30, 2025

The public engagement process seeking feedback on options related to the off-leash dog area at Chemainus Ball Park's Field 3 got underway.

The Recreation department partnered with the Kiwanis Club for sponsored free swims at the Cowichan Aquatic Centre, which took place throughout the summer.

The Management Team attended training on June 23 that focused on First Nations culture, history, and the implications of that history on current relations and operations.

Staff volunteered their time at Cowichan Tribes' annual National Indigenous Peoples Day celebration event. North Cowichan offered financial support to Halalt First Nation, Lyackson First Nation, and Penelakut Tribe for their events.

The Squ'apthut – Gathering Place art installation at the entrance of Waterwheel Park was unveiled. The structure,

created by Penelakut artist Maynard Johnny Jr., reflects the community's connection with the Penelakut Tribe and highlights elements of their cultural history.

Staff collaborated with Halalt First Nation, Ministry of Transportation and Transit, RCMP, and SpeedWatch to address Halalt First Nation's concerns around increased traffic volumes and speeding through the community due to a detour that was put in place to accommodate the projects at the Herd Road Bridge and the Herd Road/Bell McKinnon roundabout.

In June, Council adjusted the implementation schedule for the Zero Carbon Step Code from EL-4 back to EL-1 to align with the provincial implementation schedule. The Building Bylaw will be amended to reflect the change.

Insulation was added to the Duncan Curling Club to improve building energy efficiency. The renovations came in approximately \$30,000 under budget.

After much planning and engagement, the Economic Development Action Plan was adopted by Council in May.

The City of Duncan and North Cowichan sent a joint letter to the Minister of Health advocating for consultation on the future use of the Cowichan District Hospital site to align a redevelopment plan with efforts to address the community crisis needs. Staff continue to work with Together We Can to establish a recovery centre in North Cowichan, which is expected to open in Q4.

A Zoning Bylaw amendment to facilitate a 28-unit apartment building on Vian Street, which includes affordable units for clients of Clements Centre, received its first three readings from Council. Further work related to this development, including a housing agreement to ensure long-term affordability, is expected to be brought to Council in Q3.

Quarter 2 included the success of several grant funding opportunities:

- The Fire department was awarded a grant through the 2024 Community Emergency Preparedness Fund program for wildland firefighting and personal protective equipment.
- The Fire department was awarded a grant through the Union of BC Municipalities for mobile data technologies.

· Youth Outreach Services received grant funding.



from PlanH Community Connectedness to host a youth job training series.

 The grant application to the Rural Economic Diversification and Infrastructure Program was successful. This funding will support the design of water infrastructure to service the industrial properties off Highway 18.

North Cowichan continues to recognize the great work of staff in several ways throughout the year. This quarter included Administrative Professionals Day. More than 50 staff were recognized with a card and a small gift. The annual staff pancake breakfast was held in June, with the senior leadership team providing cooking and serving duties.

Communications were sent to staff in recognition of International Firefighters Day (May 4), National Police Week (May 11-17), International Day against Homophobia, Transphobia and Biphobia (May 17), and Pride Month (June).

Art Mann Park has new playground equipment featuring enhanced safety, accessibility, and inclusion features. New engineered wood fiber surfacing has been installed with rubberized pathways. A new accessible pathway leading from the parking lot to the playground and dock ramp has been constructed. A new accessible picnic table was also installed, with one planned to be installed at Kin Beach park in Q4. A new dock was installed at Art Mann Park. The 16'x80' aluminum frame dock includes universal water access for kayaks, canoes, and retractable cleats for boats to tie up. The playing surface of the tennis courts at Properties Park has been repaired and upgraded, enhancing the playing conditions. The Cowichan Aquatic Centre annual maintenance shutdown occurred September 14-October 6. Significant mechanical upgrades were performed during this time, including the installation of a new building automation system	 ✓ Chemainus Ball Field 2 received infield upgrades to address drainage and player safety issues. Work was completed in the off season so that the field is ready for community use at the start of the 2025 ball season. ✓ Machine trail maintenance was completed on the upper Double D trail located on Mount Tzouhalem. This trail is subject to heavy ridership and use and requires regular maintenance supported by the Cowichan Trail Stewardship Society. ✓ Staff replaced the gazebo roof along the Crofton Seawalk as the original structure had shown signs of excessive wear and had exceeded its life expectancy. The new metal roof is a welcomed addition and was completed by carpentry staffing. ✓ Brooke Street sewer main replacement. ✓ Crofton Fire Hall completion. ✓ November 15 was the grand opening of the Field House at the Cowichan Sportsplex. 	 ✓ The public spaces cleaning operations continue into Q1 with two part-time staff providing daily cleaning measures along the corridor areas of Beverly, York, Lewis and James Street, including Somenos dykes, Cowichan Commons, and University Way areas. ✓ Youth Outreach Services received localized grant funding to expand and upgrade equipment for youth enjoyment which includes new scooters and skateboard helmets. ✓ The Cowichan Aquatic Centre and Fuller Lake Arena were community focal points of activity on Family Day offering free skating and swimming opportunities to the community. ✓ Machine trail maintenance continued on the lower sections of the Double D trail to improve safety and ridership on Mount Tzouhalem. ✓ Parks staff completed trail maintenance work and a culvert replacement along the Chemainus Lake trail which has improved accessibility, safety, and environmental protection. 	 ✓ New safety netting was installed on Field 3 at Evans Baseball Par in collaboration with the Dunca Junior Baseball Association. The netting improves spectator safety, reduces ball retrieval costs, and prevents balls from entering nearby private propert ✓ An accessible concrete pathway was constructed at Kinsmen Beach Park, connecting the parking lot to the washroom, water fountain, outdoor shower and shelter. A new accessible picnic table was also installed under the shelter, with support from the Local Community Accessibility grant and the Rota Club of Chemainus. ✓ A new pedestrian bridge has been constructed at Herons Wood Park, replacing the previous 30 metre wooden structure over Raphael Creek. This improves public access and staff performing maintenance. ✓ Staff received noise complaints from the pickleball courts at And Hutchins Park in Maple Bay. Staff intend to set up a meeting with residents to better understand the concerns and review potentimitigation options.
